Open yourself to exploration at Vancouver's Spiritual Playground

Or Shalom's new house of study is your chance to deeply engage in Jewish history, text, and custom. Open to the community at large, Zusia is an invitation to profound learning in a **liberal context – non-dogmatic, egalitarian, and inclusive**. Zusia is serious but playful study and is for all learners who are interested in examining the multi-faceted nature of Torah and Jewish culture.

Each course is taught by an instructor with specialized knowledge and a passion for expressive and deep thought. Our *bet midrash*, literally "house of learning," takes place at Or Shalom in East Van. On a given night, more than one circle of study runs at once, to give a true sense of a school buzzing with activity and discussion. At the beginning and end of each class, students from all courses join together for meditation or singing.

In keeping with the bet midrash tradition, Zusia embraces non-frontal learning, with study often taking place in chevrotot - pairs.

Courses range from four to 10 weeks in length. Most courses are perfect for the curious beginner as well as intermediate learners while others offer an opportunity for more advanced knowledge seekers to dig a little deeper.

Why Zusia?

Our school's name is a nod to Reb Zusia of Hanipol, a great *tsaddik* of the 18th century, who, in the moments before death, wept uncontrollably. His students tried to comfort him telling him he was almost as wise as Moses and as kind as Abraham. But the rebbe replied: "When I get to Heaven, I will not be asked, 'Why weren't you like Moses?', or 'Why weren't you like Abraham?' I will be asked, 'Why weren't you like Zusia?' Why did I not live up to my own potential?"

The Bet Midrash at Or Shalom offers a path home to our best selves.

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Courses

Zusia runs over three trimesters, beginning October 2018 and ending June 2019. Please see each course description for details on suggested prerequisites or required materials. Trail of Text: 3,400 Years of Jewish History Through Our Great Books

This three-part course goes back to the beginning (*b'reishit*) and traces Jewish history from ancient Israel through the creation of the Jewish diaspora and up to the modern period. We will anchor our narrative and discussions in a piece of text from the time periods, which we will read and discuss together *bet midrash* style.

Instructor: Matthew Gindin

Prerequisites: No prerequisites or background. Course runs over three trimesters; students may enrol for all or one.

Materials: None; notes will be provided.

Trail of Text Part I: From Mesopotamia and Back

The period spanning from Abraham's arrival in Canaan from Mesopotamia (modern day Iraq) through the creation of the Babylonian Talmud as a result of exile from Israel (also in modern day Iraq). The rise and fall of ancient Israel and the creation of the Hebrew Bible, Mishna, and Talmud, as well as the birth of Christianity, Islam, and Rabbinic Judaism.

Trail of Text Part II: The Rise of Jewish Philosophy and Mysticism, and the Creation of the Global Jewish Diaspora

The rich period of the development of Jewish theology and law as we know it, as well as the development of diverse Jewish cultures in many parts of the world. The era of Rashi and Maimonides and the birth of Kabbalah, as well as the standardization of Jewish law and the bold and shocking mysticism of the Zohar.

Trail of Text Part III: The Creation of the Kaleidoscope of Modern Judaism

The period of the split of pre-modern Orthodoxy into Hasidic and non-Hasidic Orthodoxy; the Maskilim (Jewish Enlightenment); the Reform movement; Zionists, Jewish Socialists, and others which underlie the rich tapestry of "Judaisms" in the modern world. The era in which Jewish radicals and intellectuals helped build the modern world, Yiddish civilization was largely destroyed, and the state of Israel was built.

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Nine Psalms for Shabbat Morning

The cycle of nine psalms in our Sabbath morning *pesukei dezimra* begins with our wonder at the natural world. It then takes us from the Torah and *mitzvot* that connect us to that world, to deeply personal and universal human fears and concerns, to God's saving power; to our history as the people of Israel, to the joy of Shabbat, and finally returns us to the overwhelming nature of God's creation and the power of God's order. We will study seven of these psalms: Psalms 19, 34, 90, 135 and 136, and 92 and 93.

Materials: A siddur with the full cycle in the traditional order will be useful to bring. Course handouts will include each psalm in Hebrew and in contrasting English translations.

Hasidic Texts on Prayer

Favourite texts on the nature of prayer, its purpose, and its effect on human consciousness. Through class discussion and multi-level *chevruta*-paired study in Hebrew or English (or both), we'll unpack teachings on "breaking through" the words of liturgy, allowing the soul to "sing for herself," praying for the health of God, and the power of a broken heart. Each class will include primary source study, questions for deepening, and collaborative integration of the material into our own experience.

Passover Prep

This class will prepare us for innovative, learned, and deep Seder evenings. *Chevruta*-paired text study will focus on the *Haggadah*, commentaries on the *Hagaddah*, potential supplementary texts, and teachings on the themes of *Pesach*. The course will include an egalitarian sharing of best Seder strategies, and will build the beginning of a loose-leaf resource book for future reference. Finally, attention will be paid to *Sefirat haOmer*, introducing some thoughts on numbering seven weeks of days, and brainstorming creative ways to enter mindful practice during that period, beginning on the second day of Passover.

Fasting, Rain, and Three Magicians: Magic in the Talmud

Although witchcraft was forbidden in Leviticus/*Vayikra*, magic was widely practiced in the late Second Temple period. The rabbis of the Talmud believed that magic was real and legitimate when performed by sages who used the power of Torah. This course will explore the lives and magical abilities of three famous Talmudic magicians: Honi HaMa'agel, Nachtimon ben Gurion and Nachum Ish Gamzu. We will also learn something about the efficacy of fasting and wonder about how publicly demanding of God we can be.
