I also spent several months working with the White Mountain Apache in Arizona - a very different experience from working on the Northwest Coast!

I now work for Musqueam Indian Band as the Senior Archaeologist and, along with a team of archaeologists, manage and protect the many archaeological sites in Musqueam's territory.

In my spare time, I volunteer for Jewish Queer and Trans Vancouver and Qmunity. When I'm not working or volunteering I can usually be found outdoors with my spouse Kim, watching (a lot) of Star Trek and reading sci-fi, and singing off-key to our 10-year-old basset hound Rufus.

After struggling to find a Jewish community that felt like a good fit, I feel so fortunate to have found Or Shalom. I've found a connection to myself, my culture, and my community in the meditation retreats, Zusias, holiday events, and especially in the Friday night Shabbat candle lighting.
