"Before We Cross Over"

Before the Reading of the Torah: The Summary

Shabbat Shalom Dear All

I am honoured this morning in coming up to the Torah and in the good company of The Women of Heart Centered Torah Study – with those that could not be here this morning, with those who will not be speaking today, and with those who will be: Barbara Silver, Tiferet Welch, Ros Kunin, Emma Mas, Tanya Paz, Rahel Cela Behar, and Kathy Brandon whose words I will share. We are honoured to be with you!

We open hold now the very last two chapters of the Book of B'Midbar, In the Wilderness. We stand, at last, on the bank of the Jordan looking towards Jericho and our new homeland, and we are about to enter The Promised Land. The words inscribed here in the Torah hold us upright, holding us in honour of the sacred vows we will make and we will speak. These last words before our crossing over hold us steady, despite the tugs and pulls and terrific struggles we may encounter with those who we will still meet and who might oppose us. These last words shape how we will live with each other in the land – how we will be able to create homes and cities for ourselves and for those who have become dispossessed.

From the brief amended summaries, courtesy of Nutshells by Chabad, here are Matot/Masei

Parashat Matot discusses laws of vows, the destruction of Midianite towns, and negotiations of the Reubanites and Gadites to settle land outside of Israel.

Parashat Masei discusses the stations of the Israelites' journeys, instructions for taking the land of Israel, the six cities of refuge for the Levites, and the bequeathment of land to the daughters of Zelophehad.

In this triennial year two, we are reading in the Torah, 7 aliyot from Chapters 32 – Chapters 33. I have chosen two of them – the very first (the Reubenits' and Gadites' request to stay on the pasture lands east of the Jordan) and the very last (the recounting of the death of Aharon on Mount Hor and so the passing on of this leadership and priesthood to his son, Eliazer and the nation).

So, in this day and in this time, we are looking here for home coming, for where we do belong, at what has been given to us and what belongs to us. We are looking at settlement. We are looking here at making peace with what we love, where we are safe, what we will be given, and what we will give.

We will have only two Aliyot this morning and the second will include the Healing Aliyah.
